Listen to the Music by Harold and Meredith Sears

One of the peculiarities of Round Dancing, as compared to most of the rest of the ballroom world, is the extent to which we listen to the cuer. Especially when we are learning new dances, new figures, and new steps—

we listen hard to our cuer. We focus on the cues. What is that figure? What is he asking us to do? What is my next step? We listen so hard to the cues that we sometimes forget to listen to the music.

Maybe it's not forgetting, exactly. The cuer just said Hover Telemark, and I'm thinking, "ohoh, what's the difference between a Hover and a Hover Telemark", and before I get that figured out, he's cued a Natural Weave. I know what a Weave is, but this one goes to the right instead of the left. Wait a minute! It only turns right in the first measure; then I must swoop back to the left again. All this stuff is swirling around in my head. It's not that I've forgotten to listen to the music; my brain is full—there's no room for the music.

But we must *make* room. The brain really is vast. We can carve out room for the music, along with the cues. The problem is that the cuer is telling us what to do. He is telling us what figure to execute, maybe which way to face, what step to take; but he is not telling us when to take that step. The cueing tells us *what* to do, but the music tells us *when* to do it.

A good cuer is naming those figures well ahead of the beat. He may even "stack" a couple of cues: "Natural Weave to a Top Spin;" and this cue might be spoken a full measure before the first step of that sequence should be taken. You can't do all that right when he says it. You need to wait until the music tells you to do it. We're dancing Foxtrot: slow, quick, quick, quick, quick, quick, quick, quick, quick, quick. The cuer will cue the sequence well ahead, but we need to wait for that "slow" to sound in the music. Dance the Natural Weave to the music. Don't rush, fearful that you won't be able to fit the Top Spin in. The choreographer made this dance fit the music. Don't start the Top Spin until the seventh "quick." Is it like the game Simon Says? The cuer isn't Simon; the music is Simon.

Listen to the music. Can you hear the beats: 1, 2, 3, 4; 1, 2, 3, 4; slow (1, 2) quick quick; slow quick quick. How can you tell the difference between a 1 (the start of a slow) and a 4 (a quick)? The 1 is a "downbeat." It is a little louder or somehow emphasized. Listen. Tune out the cues for a moment. Listen to the rhythm—slow, quick, quick. Can you hear it? Try to begin your step before the beat actually falls, so your foot hits the floor on the beat. You do have latitude here, but if you don't start to move until the beat occurs, then your step will feel late.

After all this, can you simply *not* he

ar the beat: 1, 2, 3, 4? Then try hard to sense the movements of your partner and dance to that rhythm. If just one in a couple can hear the beat, that is often enough—if the other will attend and respond.

Editor's Note:

We recently lost a legend in the area of Colorado Round Dancing. We lost Ty in 2013 and we lost Ann in February 2021. Following are two articles written about them. The first is the article which is written about them in the CRDA Hall of Fame. The second is a resume that Ty & Ann wrote themselves about their impact on the Round Dance world. They made contributions in our local area along with our state and national levels. Their names are etched in the history of Round Dancing.



It seems that Ty and Ann Rotruck have been contributing to Round Dancing in Colorado forever. Way back in the 60s, they learned to Square Dance and then to Round Dance. Since the very beginning they have worked to keep Square and Round dancing together. They have danced with virtually all the clubs in the Denver area. Their membership in the CRDA goes back to 1964. Even before they were active as cuers they contributed to the CRDA. They were newsletter editors for a couple of years; they have held offices of treasurer, vice-president, and president; and they worked out the early procedures for the consistent operation of the CRDA. They started teaching Round Dancing in 1973. That same year, they bought the old church from Jack and Darlene Chaffee and

named it the "Truck Stop". The operation of this building brought them in contact with most of the local dancers and cuers and led to their famous collection of photos featuring national callers and cuers. For 17 years the Truck Stop was the home of their own Round Dance program and influenced a large number of dancers. Ty and Ann have also been active in many caller and cuer organizations. They have been officers in the Denver Area Caller's Association and in Roundalab. They have attended and taught at many state and national festivals. Through this, they have been busy promoting the Colorado dance activities and acting as ambassadors of the local dance activity. They have been the featured instructors for at least a dozen of these festivals. For the past seven years they have spent the winter in the Rio Grande Valley of Texas., but every year they have come back to Colorado where they make their home and dance with their longtime friends. In May of 1997 they were inducted into the Denver Area Square and Round Dance Council's Hall of Fame. Now they are being inducted into our CRDA Hall of Fame.

Ty and Ann met while roller skating and were married in 1945. Although they had planned to participate in Square Dancing early in their marriage; family, college and house remodeling interfered, and it was not until 1960 that they were able to schedule a beginning Square Dance class. This was also their introduction to Round Dancing as their caller instructor included mixers and easy rounds as part of his beginning Square Dance program. Becoming fascinated with Round Dancing, they attended a



beginning Round Dance class taught by Charlie and Jerry Tuffield and danced spasmodically with their Silver Dollar Club and other area Round Dance clubs.

After Ty received his degree in Mathematics, more time was available, and they began dancing regularly with the Chaffee's. This began ten years of wonderful carefree Round and Square Dancing. They traveled the country attending festivals and Round and Square Dance weeks. Ty and Ann treasure the memory of the wonderful people met, and the many friends made during these travels.

Ty and Ann began their teaching careers in 1973 when the Chaffees decided to move to Mesa, Arizona, and were asked to consider taking over their clubs. After serious consideration, Ty and Ann decided to give teaching a try, and also decided to buy Chaffee's "old church". With a vision of making it into an exceptional center for round and square dancing.

It is the dream of many teachers and callers to have their own hall. Ty and Ann accomplished this on their own and are extremely proud of the "Truck Stop" as the hall was named (a play on their name and no semis

have shown up - yet). The experience of bringing the Truck Stop Center into fruition is another story in itself. Particularly, when the building was completely torn apart, and they found they had insufficient funds to continue, and to complete it. The Truck Stop was paid off on April 1st, 1986. They are extremely grateful to the dancers and clubs that stayed with them while they developed the skills necessary to become competent teachers and hall managers. Their advice to anyone wanting to build or remodel a hall is to be sure to have 200% utilization and forget it unless they are millionaires.

While spending countless hours remodeling and maintaining the Truck Stop, Ty and Ann also had to learn to teach and to cue four different levels of Round Dancing at the same time as they took over easy, intermediate, and high intermediate clubs as well as starting a beginning class. Hindsight says this is not the recommended approach. Ty and Ann now have fourteen years of teaching and operating clubs and are proud of their graduates, and those who have moved on to become teachers/cuers.

Currently, Ty and Ann operate three different level clubs the year round (Phase I & II+; Phase III & IV+; Phase V & VI). They conduct two beginning classes each year, and one or two intermediate (Phase III - V) classes. Ann graduated from Herb Egender's Columbine Caller Cuer School so both Ty and Ann cue for numerous area square dance clubs. They are Club cuer for a closed Advance square dance club (Mavericks) whose philosophy is to encourage Round Dancing at the advanced level. They are also Club teacher and cuer for a long-established Denver Waltz Club who use the Truck Stop. Ann is the dance choreographer for this dance team. Her most successful dance is "Me and My Shadow" written for a Colorado State Square Dance Festival, and which became a ROM around the country. Others are "The Entertainer", "My Favorite Things", "Little Bitty Tears", and a series of excellent unpublished dances written as exhibition dances based on the theme of the Maverick's yearly party dance. Due to the responsibilities imposed by the Truck Stop, dance composition has been a secondary activity.

Ty and Ann have participated in six National Square Dance Festivals as well as numerous Colorado State Square Dance and Colorado Round Dance Festivals. They have been featured instructors at Round and Square Dance festivals throughout the western states, conducted weekends for local clubs, and annually put on a traditional "Christmas in July" Round Dance party at the Truck Stop.

At the present, Ty and Ann are members of Roundalab, URDC, Colorado Round Dance Association, Denver Area Callers Association, and numerous state and local councils, so they are cognizant of local Round Dance trends. They have just completed six years on the Board of Directors of Roundalab where they were Standardization Planning Chairman for their entire term on the Board. They are past presidents of the Colorado Round Dance Association as well as former Newsletter editor and treasurer. They have also been treasurer and on the executive board of the Denver Area Callers Association.

They feel their major contribution to dancing in the Denver area is making available a clean, wholesome, and technically excellent Round and Square facility where a goodly number of dancers have enjoyed excellent Round and Square Dancing to top leaders. On the state level, they believe their work in developing a Handbook of Policies, Duties, and Procedures put the Colorado Round Dance Association on a business-like operational basis. Nationally, they are proud of the progress made in Round standardization over the past six years, and although there is still a long way to go, they believe the impact will be long lasting.

Their basic philosophy of round dance instruction is to keep it FUN while emphasizing basics and maximizing the use of hash cues. In the beginning MAKE HASTE SLOWLY and minimize teaching numbers of routines until the basics are being danced comfortably. Precision and styling should be introduced as soon as feasible. Flexibility is paramount, since every class is different, so the teacher must adapt their program and techniques to their student's needs. They feel continuing education and self-improvement is extremely important, so they attend seminars, and are building an extensive library of books, audio and video tapes. Finally, they believe Round And Square Dancing belong together, and the high level, experienced dancer should participate at all levels.

Foot Watching

You shouldn't have to be told that foot-watching is a "no-no." Looking down at your feet as you dance creates bad posture, bad appearance and most importantly, bad balance.

To look down at your feet, you must tilt your head forward and bend a bit at the waist, throwing that weighted ball on top of your neck off center from the spine. This not only creates an imbalance; it also makes it impossible for you to lead or be led. You are out of position to feel what your partner is doing.

Just as important, foot watching destroys your timing. A dancer needs to react to the music. There is not enough time to stop and think about each step. Foot watching requires an analysis of what you just saw and what to do next.

Once the music starts, you don't have time to watch, analyze or reason out what to do. You need to move. You can do one or the other, depending on which part of your brain is "winning" the war of information.

Scientists, beginning with Sigmund Freud, tell us the brain has an ongoing internal struggle over how to deal with incoming information—between its unconscious side, called the "protective" brain, and the conscious brain, called the "executive brain." The executive brain thinks and makes informed decisions. It requires focused attention to analyze what it sees or feels.

The protective brain, on the other hand, is what allows us to multi-task, to perform without thought. Its function allows someone who hasn't ridden a bicycle for years to get back on a bicycle and pedal off. It is capable of simultaneous thought and action. The conscious brain takes effort. It is said information reaches and triggers the unconscious brain five times faster than it does in the conscious brain.

The unconscious brain is said to operate continuously, secretly influencing most of our decisions. This is not always a good thing. It influences what we think we see, leading to the problem encountered with eyewitness statements which prove to be flawed. This is scientifically called naïve reality. We see things not always as they actually are, but as our brain tells us they are. Confucius, 2500 years ago, said it like this: "We see what is behind our eyes."

When it comes to dancing, you will be on time if you allow the unconscious brain to react to the music. If you activate the conscious brain, it will stop the flow to relay what the eyes and ears record and search its memory for the correct response.

Let the unconscious brain react to the music and your partner's movement. Disregard attempts by the executive brain to question if that might be wrong. So, what if you are wrong? Accept the mistake and keep going.

A Pream is...

We know how to walk without looking down at our feet. We walk, we run, we back up without the need to monitor ourselves, unless we are crossing a tricky surface. Dancing imposes three main differences from walking that encourage foot-watching: 1) we're coordinating with another person, the partner; 2) we're doing it in time to music; and 3) most dance steps involve some form of turn or spin. Dancing also involves combining groups of steps into figures, different from just plain walking, and sometimes we just have not learned the figures.

The secret is to practice so the unconscious brain will have a memory of what to do and do it before the executive brain tries to take charge. If you do something often enough, your body will get used to it.

The third difference especially improves with practicing proper technique. To spin, stand tall, with your head aligned with your spine. Make sure you are in balance over your standing foot and remember to breathe. Add spotting, the technique of focusing on a specific spot at eye level, to prevent dizziness in a spin.

With spotting, your head is the last body part to leave and the first to arrive in a spin. Your body rotates at an even speed, but your eyes stay focused on your spot as long as possible. When you cannot keep looking at it, you quickly turn your head to find the spot again.

You can practice this starting first with walking through a turn. Pick a spot which is easy to find, like a door frame, instead of an imaginary spot on the wall. Keep your body speed up with the shoulder leading the spin; don't let it rotate faster than you.

All this extra effort will pay off in confidence in your unconscious brain. Learning is a process of trying and failing until you make it work. As playwright Samuel Beckett implores: "Try again. Fail again. Fail better."

> Dancing is slowly returning. We hope everyone continues to be healthy and safe. We hope more dancing is in our future. Spring is just around the corner. We're hoping to see some spring flowers popping up soon. The three foot+ snowstorm put a cramp in many plans including dancing.

We were saddened to learn of the losses our movement has had these last few weeks. Ann, Susie and Tom will be Round Dancing again with no pain. Our sympathies go to the families.



Minutes:

A motion was made, seconded and passed to approve the minutes as corrected. The corrections were the spelling of Rotscheid under the Minutes on page 1, and 4 instances of acclimation changed to acclamation under the Election of Officers on page 2.

Treasurer's Report: (Frankie Travis)

A motion was made, seconded and passed to approve the treasurer's report as presented.

President's Report: (Steve Pitts)

With the availability of the vaccine and the lower positivity rates, many dancers are expressing a desire to start dancing again. We are excited to hear some dance groups have restarted or will be restarting again soon.

We contacted Jim Schwartzkopff at the Avalon Ballroom to discuss the current status. Availability at this time is still very limited.

Based on Occupancy Rates at the IDC and current COVID Guidelines we will not need to limit the number of Dancers attending. John and Karen will provide a report later during the board meeting.

Steve reviewed the CRDA Bylaws and Redbook (CRDA procedures). Patrick Krause and Karen Herr have agreed to work together to update the "Red Book" with changes requested for our CRDA operating procedures. Both the Bylaws and the CRDA Procedures need updating to be more current, for example: Standing committees listed in the Bylaws do not match the standing committees listed in the Procedures. We request each of the CRDA Board Members take some time to review these documents and provide updates for areas which may be out-of-date. As a reminder, any Bylaw Changes will require a vote at the General Membership meeting

CRDA membership renewals were due on January 1, 2021. We do not pro-rate dues for current members who are late renewing their membership.

Vice President: (Jim and Margie Garcia)

Jim received an email from Ron Rumble thanking us for the Dance Summary we send out. It has been very helpful for programming festivals. Especially the Phase II-III lists, since there are not many resources out there for the lower-level dances.

Secretary: (Chelsea Thompson)

No report

"Snappy" Spring Dance: (Karen Herr)

Karen invited Dave Smith, Mitchell Thompson and Roy Knight to cue on the meeting. Mitchell and Dave are available, Roy is a maybe. Bob Nolan was also invited to cue. He said he has both of his shots, but Sally has none. If Sally is able to get her shots by the dance, he may come down to cue as well. We decided on meeting at 1:00 p.m. for setup. We will not be providing food at the dance. This will be added to the flyer. We are, however, considering providing water bottles.

2021 Gala: (Melanie Thompson)

I have sent the initial emails to the two cuers with introductions and general format. Still working with the hotel to get everything in writing but have not been successful so far. Mitchell will be reaching out to the cuers to work with them on the program. I am looking for one host couple for Hicks for the weekend. We have had one couple register in addition to the roll-overs.

2021 Fun Dance: (Steve Pitts)

Should we increase the cap on couples in attendance?

We had a very successful Feb. 27th, 2021 Fun Dance with John Herr and Becky Evans at the Rose Hill Grange. John provided a Phase IV+1 Rumba teach (Distant Mountain Sunset (Sato)) at the beginning of the dance. Ten couples attended. We were a "spare" couple to fill in during less crowed times.

The March Fun Dance will be Sunday afternoon, March 14^{th} , at Rose Hill Grange, Harold Sears and Mitchell Thompson will be cuing. As of March 5^{th} , we have five couples signed up for the dance. Would we like another teach for this Dance?

Are we comfortable with increasing the number of couples for the March Fun Dance from the current 10 to? We had three or four couples on a "waiting list" for the Feb. 2021 dance. We would suggest increasing the dance limit to at least 12 couples for Rose Hill Grange. Maple Grove is larger and allows a higher limit.

We held some discussion about continuing to require masks at the Fun Dances and decided it was a good idea for us to require them for the foreseeable future. I was reminded that for new members, the pro-rate membership amount needs to be updated to \$2/month on the website in Round Notes.

We asked Mitchell and Chelsea Thompson to do a teach/clinic before the March Fun Dance and they accepted. We also discussed increasing the limit on couples. Per the current limits, we can have 50 people or 50% capacity at the Rose Hill Grange and 175 or 50% capacity at the Maple Grove Grange. We came to a general consensus to increase the couple cap to 15 couples and two cuer couples at both locations.

Membership: (Erik Von Hortenau)

We currently have 102 membership units. A majority of people have renewed their membership. We had a few contact Erik and say they would not. It was brought up that we need to remove the people who did not renew their membership so we can update reflector list. This needs to be done by March 1st going forward so we have time to get the reflector list updated before the first Round Notes of the year.

Cuer Selection Committee: (Steve Pitts)

Cuers are set up through 2023. As always, the Cuer Selection Committee accepts recommendations, though they are not guaranteed to be selected.

Promotion/Publicity: (Fred and Judy Layberger)

All the Fun Dance flyers and the Spring Dance flyers are finished pending the corrections discussed in this meeting. We are only sending them out two at a time as there may need to be changes to the flyers as COVID restrictions change. The Fun Dance schedule is on the website along with the Gala flyer. The Gala posterboards have been updated. It was mentioned that Vogt and Hicks need to receive copies of the Gala Flyer for their distribution.

Round Notes: (Karen Herr)

The deadline for Round Notes is March 15th. Please send Karen any articles you think the community might enjoy along with any club/dancer news.

Website: (Steve Pitts on behalf of Harold Sears)

The last several meetings, we have been discussing changing the hosting service for the CRDA website. We currently have a cap of 2 GB of storage and 5 GB of data transfer. We reached out to the current hosting service to find out how much it would cost to upgrade. We could get 5 GB of storage and 20 GB of data transfer for \$24/mo. As discussed in previous meetings, we also got a quote from HostGater. We would get undefined storage and unmetered data transfer for \$170/yr. Harold hosts his personal website through Ionos.com a.k.a Ionos 1 and 1. He pays \$240/year and has the capability to host multiple domains. He has offered to host the CRDA website for \$25/yr. This would also be unlimited storage and unmetered data transfer. Discussion was held regarding his offer. The main points brough up were that we would lose the email reflector list which would affect Round Notes and we would have to come up with an alternative. It was also mentioned that there could be some challenges with putting an organization under an individual's service. Many people agreed with keeping CRDA separate. We discussed approaching Ionos to see if they would give us a deal for being a non-profit. Harold has a premium account which would not be necessary for CRDA. Ultimately it was decided that we would ask Harold to present a list of options at the next meeting for the board to vote on. However, our current service renews in April. Frankie is going to look into us moving to month-to-month payment, but this may end up being groundwork for switch-over in 2022.

Historian: (Meredith Sears)

No report, but Meredith has requested that if anyone has pictures of Ty & Ann Rotruck (together or separately), please send them to Karen. They are putting together a memorial.

CSSDA Report: (Jim and Judy Taylor)

No report.

DAS&RDC Report: (Judy Taylor)

Many square dances are still cancelled for the first quarter due to Covid-19 restrictions: check the website: DAS&RDC for up-to-date info or check with individual dance clubs. The Colorado State Festival was cancelled. The National SDC (June 23rd, 24th, 25th) in Jackson, Miss. is still being planned. Their state has opened up, and we're fairly sure they will have to have the NSDC and pay their \$70,000 commitment to the Convention Center. They have somewhere around 2000 registered at this time.

Jim and I are representing USDA at Roundalab this year (before the Jackson NSDC). We will only be able to attend for a couple days, due to our own USDA meetings, but we'll take pictures and can give a short report on Roundalab if no one else is going.

Old Business:

CRDA becoming a 501c3 update: (Mitchell Thompson)

Mitchell reached out to Ponderosa Promenaders Square Dance Club, who as a registered 501c3 participated in the King Soopers program. They said the last check they for was \$198 for one quarter. Apart from the King Soopers program, we discussed whether or not there would be any other benefits to becoming a 501c3. One thing brought up: if any of the venues give us a better rate for being 501c3. The granges already give us a cut rate and would likely not give us a discount if we were 501c3. Colorado State University (Gala), on the other hand, might give us a better rate. Melanie will have Gary ask them about that. This would also allow our dancers to deduct money spent for CRDA on Schedule A if they itemize their taxes, though many in attendance of the meeting said this is likely not the case for many of our members. Jim Taylor attended the meeting in the capacity that CSSDA is the 501c3 sponsor and gave us a little more information on what it would take for us to become a 501c3 through CSSDA. There is a one-time \$100 fee to set it up. After which, there is a \$25/year membership fee to CSSDA and a \$50/year fee to maintain, making the total yearly cost \$75. A copy of our year end financials would need to be sent to USDA, largely just for them to ensure we are still active. Finally, our bylaws would need to meet a couple criteria. It would need to indicate that our fiscal year is equal to a calendar year. And that all monies would need to go to another 501c3 or the state we should be terminated. This would require bylaw changes on the part of CRDA, which lead many in attendance to say that becoming a 501c3 sounds like more work than we would conceivably get from the benefits.

New Business:

Announcements from Bob Nolen

ICBDA is currently planned on being held. Karen Herr is the day chairperson for this event. At this time, the New Mexico Round Dance Association is planning on hosting a festival in September on the 1st weekend after Labor Day. The Preskitts and the Nolens will be cueing the event. That being said, the venue has been closed since February with no indication of when they will be reopening and, as such, this event may be cancelled. They are, however, still taking registrations. If are interested, it is \$150/couple for the whole weekend. If you are interested, mail a check payable to NMRDA to the following address:
