Special Announcement

CRDA Members Dan and Sandi Finch were awarded the prestigious 2022 International Choreographed Ballroom Dance Association (ICBDA) Golden Torch Award.

Dan and Sandi have been involved in our Round Dance activity for more than 40 years. They have served on various boards and committees most of that time.



Dan and Sandi are currently on the Board of Directors of ICBDA. They were the Night Program Chairman for the 2013 Reno convention, and they have served on many other convention committees over the years.

They are also currently on the Executive Committee of Roundalab (RAL) and have been elected to the Roundalab Board of Directors for several different terms.

Sandi has head of the RAL Manual of Standards for many years, and Dan and Sandi together have been in charge of the ICBDA Technical Dance Manual. They served many terms over the years on the Technical Advisory Committee which maintains the dance manual and have been TAC Chair Couple since 2013.

Sandi has also been the volunteer legal advisor for both Roundalab and ICBDA for the past 30 years.

Dan and Sandi have been teachers—mostly at the advanced level—for 22 years, hosting two Carousel Clubs. They put on the Palmquist Palm Springs Round-Up for many years and continue to host two annual one-day "weekends" in Southern California.

They have taught seminars at the RAL annual convention every year since 2001 and have done clinics or presented new material at many ICBDA conventions.

Although they teach at the advanced level, they recognize the need to bring new dancers into the Round Dance activity. As presidents of their regional Round Dance association, they sponsored open houses to attract new dancers for an afternoon of free lessons. They also set up intermediate party dances in various parts of Southern California to encourage newer dancers to make Round Dancing a bigger part of their recreational time. They also teach Round Dance basics classes at weekly square dance workshops to reach out to new dancers. Dan and Sandi are Roundalab Mini-Lab clinicians, appointed by Roundalab to put on regional workshops for Round Dance teachers.

They publish a newsletter on dancing, its history, technique, and rhythm characteristics. They also regularly write articles for the ICBDA newsletter, and their material has been reprinted in newsletters of regional organizations around the United States as well as in Scotland, Australia, and Japan.

They have choreographed over forty dances, including "Crazy World 2001", "Apassionata", "You'd Be So Nice to Come Home To", "Once You Had Gold", and "Sam's New Pants", phase IV Foxtrot, which was named the 2018 Hall of Fame dance for ICBDA.

Common Beginner Mistakes

It can be tough for people first learning to partner dance. They are told where to put their feet, but they also must be aware of the timing of the steps, the direction of movement, and what their partner is doing. To make it even more complicated, the partner is usually struggling as well and may be doing something which is competing with what you're trying to do, such as moving in the wrong direction or with the wrong foot. As a result, there are many things that can go wrong. Here are the most common beginner mistakes that we tend to see:

Looking Down

One of the greatest fears every man is he will step on the lady's foot. Seriously. It's right up there with the fear of giving a speech. As a result, it's common for men to look down at their feet while they're dancing. Women do it as well, but this malady affects men far more often.

Looking down destroys your posture and your confidence, not to mention the look of confidence you're striving to achieve as a dancer. Left unchecked, it becomes a habit which can be hard to break. It also puts a lot of extra pressure on your spine. For every inch, your head comes forward because of a downward gaze, your spine experiences about 10 lbs. of extra forward weight. That extra weight can be felt by your partner because the head weight moves into the center of the partnership, causing numerous challenges with the overall movement. By looking down, your forward movement will come from the upper body instead of from the center of gravity.

When dancing, always keep your head aligned with your spine. It helps to look slightly above the heads of people who might be standing around the dance floor. This will usually put the angle of your head in the right place.

Looking down is not just a beginner mistake. Seasoned dancers can also be guilty of casting their eyes downward, even if the head is straight. They may be watching the space on the floor to manage floor craft, or they might be thinking too much. The result will also be a look of uncertainty and lack of presence.

Failure to Close the Feet

Many dances have a requirement to "close" the feet. This technical term means bringing the feet together and immediately changing weight to the foot that just moved. When you miss that action, you will end up using the same foot again, which puts you out of alignment with your partner's foot. And that is when partners step on each other!

This is the most common mistake beginners make in the Waltz in particular. Learning to close the feet properly makes it significantly easier to learn the dance. But if you fail to change weight, then the Waltz becomes a challenge, because the feet close generally on every third step.

If you're struggling with this, try this exercise to train your feet: march the box step. You won't dance it like that, but if you lift the feet and march the steps like a soldier, you'll train your feet to be in the right place at the right time and they will automatically change feet. Once that becomes part of your muscle memory, you'll find it easy to do it with regular foot movement.

Not Finishing the Figures

Another common beginner mistake happens when the lead is busy thinking about the next figure and leads into it before finishing the figure he is currently on. No matter what dance you are performing, leading before the figure is done causes confusion for your partner and usually puts you on the wrong foot to even start the next figure. If this happens to you, try using very slow practice music, or pausing between figures as an exercise to give you thinking time so you are only performing one figure at a time instead of blending them all together. Eventually you'll get comfortable with the way the patterns fit together and can start dancing without that pause.
