The Busy Bee of Gravity

Has anyone ever said you need to be more "into the floor?" Have you felt like you don't have good balance sometimes or you're not in sync with your partner?

The problem is probably gravity, or you not understanding how it works. You know what gravity is: it's Sir Isaac Newton's theory which explains why the earth revolves around the sun, why the moon influences our tides, why we say, "what goes up, must come down." Throw a ball up in the air and it comes down. Gravity. What about you? Explaining how more complex items move is where the "center of gravity" (CG) comes in. The ball's CG is its center. Your CG is not. CG is the point at which an object is balanced, like being able to fiddle around and figure out how to keep a pencil lying across a fingertip.

We can feel the effects of gravity when we practice sway while holding a small ball in one hand. As you swing an arc with that hand down in front of the body and up almost overhead, you realize you have to counter-balance (create a "C" shape through the body by moving your head to the opposite side) so you don't fall over. That's sway. That's also a center of gravity at work.

Our general CG—the point at which we are most comfortable when we walk—is just above our waist. You don't think about falling over when you walk. If your center is higher than that, you will feel like you must speed up to catch up to keep from falling. Being into the floor means you are in balance when you can move comfortably from flexed legs using foot pressure. As dancers, we need flexible CGs. Different rhythms demand you shift your "center" up or down to achieve their specific characteristics. Your CG for quickstep is higher in the body to allow your legs the freedom to move quickly. Rumba and Tango want your CG to be low in the body so you will be more "grounded." We often talk about a center of levitation, which is a higher point in the chest, which is its own center point for top lines and picture figures. It is probably better named the Artistic Center.

Play around with your CG to figure out how to apply it. Imagine a bumble bee flew up your shirt and is now trapped inside, buzzing furiously in all directions trying to find a way out. Imagine he's up around your neck. Try walking forward picturing your center of balance in your neck. You must move faster to keep up with your top half to stay in balance. Now imagine he has flown down to your ribs. Walking becomes a little easier because the lower your CG, the more stable you are. Now, let him fly down to your pelvic area. Walking now may be a problem; you feel heavy. If he flies up a bit to just under your belly button, you should feel good taking the slow, purposeful steps of Rumba with its periodic settling.



When you rise on your toes, don't let your CG fly up into your chest. To let that happen means you will be top heavy and out of balance. Your CG may move comfortably anywhere between your pelvis and your rib cage. Practice this. You will find that to keep your CG under control, you may experience a little shifting to the side (like a small wind-up). Now you are getting creative and artful as well as smart in the physics department.

You will be most comfortable and in sync with your partner if your CGs match. Good partnering comes from following your partner's center. How can you match your partner's CG, though, if you can't control your own?

Physics in Ballroom Dancing: Balance and Stability By Kerstin Lange

To dance means to move. But it is also true that dancing is about how to stand correctly: balance and stability are extremely important for a dancer.

To understand what happens in the state of balance and what stability means, it helps to keep in mind that dancing takes place on the surface of planet Earth.

Here on Earth, forces act on the dancer's body in a characteristic way. Gravity pulls the body to the floor, the floor counters with a 'push', providing support and friction. Muscles move the dancer's body working against gravity and support while other forces outside the body (e.g. the partner) add to the sum of forces and counterforces, of pushes and pulls - in and from various directions. In physics, the forces simultaneously acting and counteracting upon a body are added resulting in a net (or remaining) force. If the result is zero, nothing happens to the body. If it is not zero, the body is moved in the direction of the remaining force.

In physics, a body can be represented by one point: the center of gravity.

Bodies are complex: they have various shapes, and they can change their shapes. In physics the body can be represented by one point: the center of gravity. Here the effect of gravity and other forces is the same as on all the different parts of the body.

The center of gravity is where you can balance an object.

Put a long ruler across your index finger. When it is in balance the center of gravity is where it rests on your finger. Based on experiences like this, the normal understanding is the center of gravity has something to do with the 'middle' of objects. In fact, it can also lie outside objects depending on the shape!

The implication is: If a body changes its shape the center of gravity moves. It can move from the center of the body to the skin, from the belly to the chest, further and further, until it is outside the body.



Balance: a vertical achievement.

The floor provides support. In physical terms, it provides a counterforce to gravity pulling the body downwards: Support means a force of equal strength pushing upwards.

Balance is achieved when the center of gravity and the support are vertically aligned. The net sum of gravity pulling downwards and the floor pushing upwards is zero. Also, other forces acting upon the body are either non-existent or their sum is zero.

The fundamental: area of support

How the dancer's body rests on the floor determines the area of support. The size of the area of support can change dramatically. It depends on whether the dancer stands on both feet or on one, with feet close together or apart, on balls or heels. In reality, there is no need to exactly align the center of gravity and the area of support vertically. It is sufficient to keep the center of gravity inside the area of support. But as soon as the area of support becomes very small an exactly vertical alignment is necessary.

Balance maintained: Stability

The center of gravity shifts when the body changes shape. This happens frequently during movement or while starting or stopping movement.

Stability means to be able to keep the center of gravity inside the area of support. The ability to stay balanced while moving is essential. Stability during movement means to keep the center of gravity inside an area of support which permanently changes size and position. Here the dancer can maintain balance by expanding the area of support.

Expanding the area of support.

When moving, the dancer must transport the center of gravity from point A to point B. This is usually done by stepping forward: from a one-foot support to the next one-foot support.

If between start and finish both feet have ground contact, the area of support is significantly enlarged giving the dancer's body a better stability: now that the transportation of the center of gravity can be done across a larger area of support, it is easier to keep the center of gravity inside its boundaries

Of course, it is still quite narrow between the left-right boundaries, so alignment is still necessary.

Call to Order: The meeting was called to order at 12:48 p.m. by President Steve Pitts.

Attendance: 40 CRDA Members in attendance.

Minutes: (Chelsea Thompson)

Minor changes submitted by Lenora Starr. Motion made by Jim Steverson and seconded by Chuck Thompson and approved by unanimous vote to approve the minutes as corrected

Election of New Board Members: (Jim Garcia)

Chuck and Melanie Thompson, Mitchell and Chelsea Thompson and Frankie Travis and Ken Matuska are rotating off. Thompsons and Thompsons are eligible for re-election. Thank you to Frankie Travis and Ken Matuska who have served six years (two terms) and are ineligible for running this term. Chuck and Melanie and Mitchell and Chelsea have agreed to stay on for another term. No other couple was nominated or volunteered to serve. The position will be filled via appointment by the President before January 1st, 2023. Jim Taylor motioned to elect the Thompson's and Thompson's to the Board. The motion was seconded by Margie Garcia. Linda Robinson motioned to approve both couples by acclamation. The motion was seconded by Lenora Starr. Treasurer's Report: (Frankie Travis)

President's Report: (Steve Pitts)

We did not have our intermediate Winter dance in 2022 due to COVID venue restrictions. We are currently planning to have the 2023 Winter dance in January and are looking for a coordinator and venue.

Spring Celebration Dance: We had a wonderful Spring Celebration Dance on April 10th with 46 dancers attending. Thank you to all the new and experienced cuers who made this a great dance for all. The dance was held at the International Dance Center (IDC) in Colorado Springs.

CRDA Badges: Badge prices have increased by 50 cents. The membership form has been updated.

Future Gala Planning: Facility rental costs continue to increase, and Gala attendance continues to decrease. CRDA Gala expenses are more than we take in. CRDA hosts a THREE hall event for phase II through VI dancers. Other festivals offer one hall. Perhaps we can come up with some ideas to increase our attendance and reduce costs while providing an event for every dancer.

Volunteers: Please consider volunteering to serve on the CRDA Board or to serve on a Gala committee (or both!!). CRDA is an all-volunteer organization. "Vote for CRDA" by serving our organization. The committees for 2023 will need to be filled.

Cuer Scholarships: The CRDA Board has voted to provide scholarships to newer CRDA member cuers to allow them to participate in educational opportunities.

New Email Tool: It has been requested for CRDA to find a new group email service or tool for sending group emails to the CRDA membership. A specific need is for emailing the Round Notes newsletter. Google Groups has issues when attachments are larger than 9 Mbytes. Also, some members' email servers seem to "not like" receiving email from Google Groups (what we currently use.) CRDA is looking for a volunteer(s) to locate a better tool. CRDA also needs to do some research on a long-term hosting service for the CRDA website. Next Board meeting: December 3rd, 2022. CRDA Board officers will be elected. Meeting will be hybrid (remote and in-person). In-person will be at Rose Hill Grange. Remote attendance will be via Zoom.

Vice President's Report: (Jim and Margie Garcia)

This year, Jim has not received as many reports from cuers about their programs. Some of this has been due to holidays and festivals causing sessions to be canceled. 2022 Fun Dance Report: (Steve Pitts)

Thank you, Chelsea Thompson, for being our Fun Dance Coordinator for 2022. The 2022 January Fun Dance was canceled due to COVID restrictions. From February through September, we averaged 19 dancers per Fun Dance. The high was 24. The low was 12. Seven dances total. We have one remaining Fun Dance in November featuring Harold Sears and John Herr. With our typical costs per dance, we have "averaged" about \$30 income per dance. A 2023 Fun Dance schedule will be provided as soon as it is available.

Debby and Tim Vogt (NV) were not available for the 2024 Gala. We are contacting other cuers for availability for 2024. We are waiting to see how the 2022 Gala does regarding costs, etc to determine if we should pursue a 2^{nd} cuer couple for 2024 and future Galas.

The next State Festival will be hosted by the Denver Council in June of 2023; Bob and Sally Nolan will be the featured cuers. In 2024, the festival will be hosted by the Southeast Council.

Demonstration dances were held at the Colorado State Fair in Pueblo on Saturday, Aug. 27th. Three squares were present. At one point, 36 people from the audience were up dancing with them! Contact the Blaneys if you would like to be involved next year.

The Junior Reps reported on dances from each of the 4 councils. This included 17 dances to be held around the state.

The National Convention (NSDC), held in Evansville, Indiana in June, had lots of Round Dancing, over 2,000 people registered. On each of the three days, there was a "Showcase of Rounds", featuring individual dance couples from around the nation performing different dance rhythms and phases. There were also clinics (John & Karen Herr from Colorado did a clinic and Showcase dances). Later in the day, "Showcasers" teach that certain dance to anyone registered----what a way to get free dance lessons! The next June National will be held in Mobile, Alabama.

USA West, a 13-western-state Square and Round Dance Convention, is modeled after the Nationals, and includes all the Showcases, clinics, and round dance halls. The last one, held in August in San Diego, had over 600 dancers. The next (the 20th) USA West will be held in Albuquerque, New Mexico, in late July.
